A Healthy Baby Begins with You

A Message from the Executive Director

Since Nov. 1, the Coalition has been promoting an initiative for African American women, ages 14–44; you may have seen our billboards or have been contacted recently with "A Healthy Baby Begins with You" campaign. Our goal is to make sure women are healthy before pregnancy, as a prevention measure for low birth weight, prematurity, and fetal and infant loss. Currently, Madison County holds the ranking as having the highest rate of fetal deaths (12.1 stillborns per 1,000 deliveries). Seventy-five percent of these were African American women. In Taylor County, the statistics are just as dire with a fetal death rate of 11.2 per 1,000 deliveries. Sixty-seven percent of these deaths were African American.¹ The Coalition is more than compelled to action.



Here is what we are doing at the Healthy Start Coalition:

- Promoting Medical Homes for African American women
- Case management and health navigation services to ensure African American women seek well-woman care and follow through with clinical care and referrals
- Referrals to community services through the Whole Child Connection
- Kiosks that allow computer access to key services
- A media campaign that will focus on newsletters, benches, public service announcements, billboards, and mass mail outs, encouraging medical homes and the Whole Child Connection
- Facilitation of a health equity commission, an action group that will be focused on minority health efforts primarily centered on maternal and child health

Here is what you can do:

- Educate the women you serve and the women you know personally about the importance of well-woman care and the importance of having a regular medical doctor for their entire lifespan
- Join the Coalition in our next door-to-door campaign to promote this agenda

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Parents as Teachers

The Landscape for Infant Development in Florida

Jefferson, Madison and Taylor Counties are ahead of the curve in terms of infant development services by implementing Parents as Teachers™ (PAT) as the approved curriculum for parenting services for Healthy Start. In March 2009 the Coalition's Board of Directors researched PAT as a solution to the need in these communities for comprehensive parenting education focused on infant development. In October 2009

11 service providers were trained and services to families officially began in February 2010.

Since that significant milestone, much at-

tention has been given the program nationwide, mostly due to the implications of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), which has substantial provisions for home visiting services under the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting program. Florida

has adopted Parents as Teachers as one of the evidence-based models for home visiting services in response to federal legislation.

Effective next year, if approved, all of Florida Healthy Start communities will be using Parents as Teachers to provide services to infants and families. Through advocacy and outreach, Parents as Teachers serves as a voice for early childhood education and champions the critical role of parental involvement and early intervention in the education continuum.

Parents as Teachers...

Last fiscal year, the Coalition area served 34 infants and their families. Six certified parent educators in **three counties** provided monthly **personal visits** to families and **group connections** focused on parent-child interaction, development-centered parenting, and family well-being. They

support parents throughout pregnancy until age three. They provide health, hearing, vision and developmental **screenings** for eligible children using ap-

proved screening tools and methods. They **connect families to resources** and help them overcome any barriers to accessing them.

Show Your Love

The Show Your Love Campaign, Phase 1 of the National Preconception Health and Health Care Initiative (PCHHC), launches on Valentine's Day and runs through National Women's Health Week in May. The campaign targets women of childbearing age (18–44 years) and includes tailored materials for both women who are planning a pregnancy in the next couple of years and those who are not. Messaging for women who are planning a pregnancy will focus on increasing awareness about the preconception time period and what women can do before they get pregnant to protect the health of their baby. Kristie Lutz, Anna Strickland and Linda Murphy from Taylor County and Pam Robinson from Madison County join the nearly 12,000 individuals nationwide with this notable credential.

The CLC credential signifies that these professionals have demonstrated the necessary skills, knowledge and attitude to provide breastfeeding counseling and management support to families who are contemplating breastfeeding, or who have problems during breastfeeding/lactation.

Dedicated to raising breastfeeding rates for all newborns receiving breast milk initially, the Healthy Start Coalition of Jefferson, Madison & Taylor Counties is committed to helping all mothers provide their babies a healthy start that can make a difference for a lifetime.



Vaccines Are Very Important To Your Baby's Health

- Breastfeeding can enhance your baby's response to certain immunizations, providing more protection.
- Breastfeeding passes many immune factors to baby; however, breastfeeding should not be considered a substitute for immunization.
- Breastfeeding while the vaccine is given to your baby or immediately afterward can help relieve pain and soothe an upset baby.
- Babies who are exclusively breastfed are less likely to run fevers after their routine immunizations than babies
 who are partially breastfed or only receive formula.
- You can receive most vaccines when breastfeeding, consult your healthcare provider.


