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Fulfilling the Promise to Mothers and Babies

The positive impact of health education services delivered at a client's home, especially for at-risk populations, is nothing short of astounding. Home visiting provides benefits that are both permanent and life changing. Moms and babies are healthier, children are safer and better prepared for school, and families are far more self-sufficient.

While each of these benefits is notable, one financial measure speaks volumes: *Every \$1 invested in home visiting results in \$5.70 in savings.* Still, it all begins with Healthy Start.

As we celebrate our 25th Anniversary, the Healthy Start Coalition of Jefferson, Madison & Taylor Counties joins our sister coalitions throughout the state in launching the Coordinated Intake and Referral program, which is designed to ensure that at-risk mothers get enrolled in both Healthy Start and all relevant affiliated programs.

"Coordinated Intake and Referral is the assertion of Healthy Start at the epicenter of a system of care for pregnant women and infants. This streamlined process is a commitment to continuous quality improvement and the inclusion of families in the services that best fit their needs. This fulfills the Coalition's vision: 'By 2020, every pregnant woman residing in JMT is offered evidence-based home visiting services, resulting in the best start in life for her baby." says HSJMT Executive Director Donna Hagan.

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What is Home Visiting? Why is it Making Such a Difference?



Consider the basics. Home visiting programs consist of visits from social workers and parent educators to low-income families with pregnant mothers and babies in the home. The visitors provide health checkups, referrals, parenting advice, and guidance with navigating other programs. The visits usually take no longer than an hour, and although they're voluntary, once mothers and families engage the programs with fidelity, health outcomes compared to those who don't participate are like night and day.

In the end, the results speak for themselves:

- ▶ Child development and school readiness
- ▶ Child health
- ▶ Family economic self-sufficiency
- ▶ Linkages and referrals to other services
- ▶ Maternal health
- ▶ Positive parenting practices
- ▶ Reduction in child maltreatment
- ► Reduction in juvenile delinquency, family violence, and crime
